Summer Workshop with Jennifer Carpenter



The first PRS summer workshop was held on Saturday, July 12th and was led by Jennifer Carpenter from Colorado. Fifteen people, mostly recorder players, attended the workshop, free to PRS members. The location in southeast Portland at TaborSpace proved to be an ideal spot for playing, with lots of natural light and cool air on a hot day. The day whizzed by with four playing sessions, broken up by lunch and coffee breaks with pastries.

Jennifer challenged everyone with an array of music from the masques and revels of English Renaissance and early Baroque theaters; she even provided parts that were less demanding for more inexperienced players. To begin with, she had us fill our recorders with air and kept us in tune. Although many of us had played some of the pieces by Henry VIII, Byrd, Morley, Adson and Holborne at other workshops or classes, she made them fresh and new with articulation, phrasing and dynamics. She always managed to spice things up with her knowledge of the history and context of the pieces.

The final delights of the day were "The Satyr's Masque" by Robert Johnson and "The First and Second Witches Dance" by John Coperario. We were ready for the rapid time changes from cut time to 6/4 to 3/2 to 2/4 to 3/4, for example, in the Johnson piece. We rose to the demand of producing spooky notes in the Coperario to conjure up the witches. We finished the day satiated with a renewed love and respect for recorders and early music.

Gerry Leatherman Historical Woodwinds

Renaissance recorders: bassano bore design, single holes, range one octave and a sixth, meantone or equal tempered; woods: hard maple, plum wood, castello.

Baroque recorders: all instruments in three pieces, double or single holes. Default for baroque instruments is equal tempered, but other temperaments possible; woods: hard maple, plum wood, boxwood, rosewood; European boxwood available for soprano and alto sizes.

Instruments generally made to order, examples on hand to try playing, a few ready for purchase.
